Hind Riad is a lawyer specialized in labor law, asylum law, and administrative law. She graduated in law from the Vrije Universiteit Brussel in 2010 and joined Progress Lawyers Network Brussels in 2011. In asylum law, Hind mainly deals with cases of (un)accompanied minors and women victims of gender-based violence. She also exercises constitutional and administrative law to challenge laws and regulations adopted in violation of fundamental rights.



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
